They simply came in with a Receptacle tester and said if he thought it was good or not good. There was a series of problems with the electrical in our home that needed to be addressed shortly after moving in. I feel if we had hired a trained electrical inspector with the knowledge of the field, that these issues would have been spotted and corrected before we signed the bill of sale.

I wish to extend on my and my fellow electrician behalf to have bill H-7015 be passed with no amendments. This bill is crucial for the learning and safety of everybody in our field and everybody we do any work for.
