## Re: H7606 – An Act Relating To Insurance – Casualty Insurance Rating

Dear Mr. Chairman:

This statement in support of H.7606 is submitted by the American Property Casualty Insurance Association (APCIA).<sup>1</sup> House 7606 amends the rating statute so that in establishing or maintaining an insured's rate or classification respecting the operation of a personal motor vehicle, widowed persons shall not be treated differently than persons in a marriage.

Passage of this bill would allow persons receiving a marriage discount to continue to remain eligible for such a discount upon the death of a spouse. APCIA believes this is appropriate both on public policy grounds and because our members tell us widowed persons, unlike other rating factors, present little, if any, additional risk.

For these reasons, APCIA supports H.7606 and urges this committee to move the bill forward.
