I am writing to request that non-public schools be removed from the current law relating to education- EDUCATIONAL SERVICES TO VERY YOUNG CHILDREN.

The French American School of Rhode Island (FASRI) supports an increase in quality early learning programs for children in Rhode Island. In a state that historically has had a majority of pre-K offerings in the private sector, we have and continue to provide programs of quality for families and children.

Non-public schools have never previously before been held to a publicly funded benchmark and rating scale process for our educational programs. It is important for non-public schools to continue to advocate for the high quality programs we currently offer within the unique frameworks already in place at our schools that account for accreditation, governance structures, and continual school improvement structures already in place. Specifically, in FASRI's case, our pre-K bilingual program not only abides to the American standards but also the French ones within the framework of a double accreditation. This gives families a very high guarantee of quality.

For those non-public schools who want to participate in this program and access the resources/public rating offered, I believe that it should be optional.

FASRI and other non-public schools in Rhode Island continue to commit themselves to ensuring quality educational programs for 3-5 year olds and want to be part of a diverse landscape of options that families have in the state of Rhode Island. We are running pre-K programs of quality which are aligned to our unique school missions and are freely chosen by families.
