RE: Support for H 5436 – The Rhode Island Assault Weapons Ban Act of 2025

Dear Chair Craven,

I am writing to you today in support of the Rhode Island Assault Weapons Ban Act of 2025. This legislation is urgently needed to protect Rhode Islanders from the gun violence epidemic.

Assault weapons—generally high-velocity, semiautomatic firearms—allow shooters to fire more rounds of ammunition over a short period of time. These firearms were designed to inflict as much damage in as little time as possible; these weapons of war have no place on our streets or in our communities.

Research has shown that states with an assault weapon ban experience a lower chance of an active shooter event and that a federal assault weapon ban could reduce mass shooting deaths by 70%. Rhode Island would join states such as Massachusetts, Connecticut, and New York in taking action to ban assault weapons.

The passage of this bill is also an issue of equity. Gun violence has a disproportionate impact on communities of color: Black Americans are 10 times more likely than people of other races to die by gun homicide, and Black women are twice as likely to be fatally shot in an instance of domestic violence.²

We have the power to make positive change in Rhode Island and reduce the fatal impact of gun violence on all communities. I hope you will join me in supporting this important legislation.
