Re: H.5305, An Act Relating to Labor and Labor Relations - Division of Occupational Health

Dear Chairman Corvese,

The undersigned members of the Rhode Island Business Coalition oppose the passage of H.5305, An Act Relating to Labor and Labor Relations – Division of Occupational Health.

H.5305 requires employers to take special precautions when employees are working in temperatures above 90 degrees or below 32 degrees, including employees that are required to stay in vehicles under these conditions or who work in warehouses. Employees would be entitled to paid rest breaks, adequate shade, warming or cooling stations, drinking water, protective equipment and clothing. An employer found in noncompliance would be subject to compensatory damages and in some cases punitive damages.

Rhode Island employers are currently subject to rules adopted by the federal Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA). These rules require every employer in general industry to conduct a hazard assessment to determine the appropriate Personal Protective Equipment to be used to protect workers from the hazards including extreme heat. The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) has published criteria for a recommended standard for occupational heat stress. The NIOSH document includes recommendations for employers about how to prevent heat-related illnesses.¹

Finally, the courts have interpreted OSHA's general duty clause to mean that an employer has a legal obligation to provide a workplace free of conditions or activities that either the employer or industry recognizes as hazardous and that cause, or are likely to cause, death or serious physical harm to employees when there is a feasible method to abate the hazard.²
