This provision safeguards against any potential confusion or ambiguity regarding the jurisdiction of the consolidated board, thereby upholding the integrity of local governance.

We believe that House Bill 7979 has the potential to serve as a model for promoting efficiency, collaboration, and innovation in local government operations. By piloting this approach, municipalities can assess its effectiveness firsthand and determine its suitability for broader implementation based on their unique needs and circumstances.

In conclusion, we urge passage of House Bill 7979 and its efforts to empower municipalities with the authority to consolidate zoning and planning boards. This legislation represents a forward-thinking solution to improve local governance and ensure the effective management of land use and development activities.
