Testimony on H-5102, Homeless Bill of Rights House Municipal Government & Housing February 4, 2025

Good afternoon, Chairperson Casey, and members of the House Municipal Government & Housing Committee. My name is Jocelyn Antonio and I serve as the Director of Program Implementation and Policy at the Hassenfeld Child Health Innovation Institute at the Brown University School of Public Health. I am providing this testimony in my personal capacity as a public health professional.

I strongly urge your favorable consideration and passage of H-5102 – An Act Relating to Property – Homeless Bill of Rights, sponsored by Representative J. Lombardi and co-sponsored by Representatives Hull, Ajello, Potter, and Felix.

This legislation proposes the **creation of a commission to establish homeless shelter standards through regulations,** a necessary step towards protecting the health and dignity of unhoused individuals in Rhode Island.

In 2024, **2,442** Rhode Islanders were unhoused, marking a **35% increase** from 2023. Alarmingly, **950 of them were families with children and unaccompanied youth**. Additionally, Rhode Island has the **second highest rate of chronic homelessness in the nation!**<sup>1</sup>

As early as 1991, the United Nations declared "the right to adequate housing" as a fundamental human right. We must approach homelessness as what it truly is: a public health issues. Folks experiencing homelessness have high rates of chronic mental and physical health conditions, co-occurring disorders, and barriers to care. Additionally, children who experience family homelessness are at risk of higher stress levels, health problems, and need for pediatric health care, which also increases costs to the overall system when interventions to address episodes of homelessness are not addressed<sup>2</sup>.

Establishing **standardized regulations for homeless shelters** is essential to mitigating these health risks by ensuring:

- Safe and Sanitary Living Conditions: Proper hygiene facilities and maintenance reduce the transmission of diseases.
- Adequate Space and Ventilation: Preventing overcrowding and ensuring proper ventilation are essential for respiratory health.
- Access to Support Services: Integrating health and social services within shelters can provide immediate care and facilitate long-term health improvements.

I urge your strong consideration and passage of House Bill 5102 as it represents a critical step in protecting the health and well-being of Rhode Island's most vulnerable residents. I urge the committee to support its passage and reaffirm our state's commitment to dignity, health, and housing as a human right.
