Paul, Sweet pea, Williams is, without a doubt, one of Rhode Island's finest. He is also one of Rhode Island's busiest. He is a true traveling—man; and, if you sit still, he will stop by wherever you are at some point. He brings with him the Sweet pea blues band, a delightful bunch, who know how to make beautiful sounds. Sweet pea, an original member of the Rhode Island Rhythm And Blues Preservation Hall Band, has a host of hip Rhode Islanders following him around; and, once you hear him, you may want to join that crowd. He probably won't mind.

What about Westerly? Westerly has the Knickerbocker, a class a venue for Rhythm and Blues. The Knickerbocker, for decades has been a prime venue for the music and the home of what might be called the Westerly sound. That is, of course, the magnificent Room Full of Blues and everything else that grew out of that. The Knickerbocker has served Rhode Island well, and I'm sure it will continue to do that.

On some nights when the moon is full, Ms. Tish and four of five of Rhode Island's finest musicians get together and morph into a groovy group called Bluz You Can Use, and then proceeds to rock the night away. They love to make people feel the music and dance to it. You don't want to miss Ms. Tish as they transforms the classy sophisticated lady into a sweet rocking mama. They know exactly what to do with Rhythm and Blues and sweet soul sounds.

Many Rhode Island's rely on the Narragansett Café In Jamestown to get there fix of the popular music influenced by Rhythm and Blues, and the Narragansett Cafe does fine job of providing it for them, too. It is indeed an area institution. It is a cozy place with good vibes; and on weekends, they provide sweet soul sounds for its Rhode Island clientele. That's what they're supposed to do, and they do it well.

Jan Schmidt, a little lady with a big, big voice and a blazing delivery. You can find her at the 133 Club, the Hometown Tavern, and other Rhode Island venues. Many of our local venues. Caution is advised when you check out this lady. You may find some of her audience carrying fire extinguishers. They do that because sometimes, when she gets a little carried away and really fires up that big, big voice, things spontaneously combust. Sometimes, it's even members of her audience. Everything does not catch fire, however, somethings just melt. Jan knows how to provide Rhode Island with her share of its allotment of Rhythm and Blues, and she does it with plenty of style and energy. Jan loves the music, and the music loves her back. It is a relationship made in heaven.

The Pub on Park Avenue is one of the places that Rhode Islanders go to dance or watch other people dance. It is one of the friendliest places on earth. Everybody has a good time there, and everybody is also welcome there. The music is ably provided by the Vintage Rhythm and Blues Ensemble and distinguished guests are also routinely on the bill. This is one of the best examples of how Rhode Islanders provide, for themselves, high-quality cultural experiences; and this one is augmented by some of the best Rhythm and Blues this area has to offer.

The Rhode Island Rhythm And Blues Preservation Hall Band is the real deal. The members of this group are vintage players who were around when Rhythm and Blues was young. We have preserved them with our own special secret concoction, all for the pleasure of Rhode Islanders. They were here when it began and they haven't forgotten anything. You can catch us touring our local libraries and community centers. You can also hear us at local Rhythm and Blues festivals. This group is full of wonderful music and also great tales of their experiences growing up playing the music. They are a warm, friendly bunch who are full of wonderful anecdotes and happy to talk to people who are interested in the history of their music.
