
There were school shootings years ago, but not the panic








Parents' fears are rebounding

Unpacking data on shootings incidents and victims

From 2012/2013 through 2021/2022, there were **1,123** shootings on school property, of which **202** were inside the school and of those **171** were during school hours.

 Victims injured by gunfire 	1,039	64 of the student fatalities
 Victims injured in school during school 	271	were from 4 incidents:
 Victims killed in school during school 	98	Sandy Hook, Parkland,
 Student killed in school during school 	83	Santa Fe & Uvalde

Only 15% of shootings and 27% of injuries occurred inside the school building during school hours. The vast majority would not be impacted by lockdown drills and other in-school security measures.

Active shooter events (ASEs) in educational settings

- FBI definition: An active shooter is an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a populated area.
- The definition does not require deal or even injury
- From 2000-2022, **48 ASEs in K-12**, averaging about two per year. That is out of about 130,000 schools.
- From 2000-2022, **18 ASEs in colleges/universities**, averaging about one per year. That is out of more than 5,000 colleges/universities.



Active shooter simulations v. drills


Schools sometimes:

- Unannounced drills
- Told "Not a drill"
- Fake blood for realism
- "Assailant" with camouflage clothing and assault rifle

Recommendations

- Simulations should involve staff and local police, but not the students
- Never do unannounced drills
 - (IL, KY, MN, NY, TX mandate announcement)
- Inform parents on scheduling
- Allow students and parents on behalf of their children to op-out
 - (GA, IL, KY, ME, MN allow parental op-out)
- Make the drill as low-key as possible and, of course, age-appropriate
- Minimize the frequency of drills, so as not to suggest danger; one or two drills per year are sufficient for learning
- Do more verbal instruction and less physical activity
- The lockdown drill frequency requirement under R.I. Gen. Laws § 16-21-4 is generally acceptable, but could be reduced to 1, especially for younger students

Rise and fall of social contagion (and public obsession)

- Eight multiple victim school shooting in 1996-2001
- "School shootings are an epidemic." Dan Rather, March 5, 2001
- Not another for 4 years

At the end of the (school) day

- No real evidence of effectiveness
- Traumatizing for many students
 - Not the same as fire drills
- Reminder of vulnerability
- Fueling swatting hoaxes
- Suggests an option for an angry or dispirited student (and strategic approach)
- Alternative ways to protect students



Safety without alarming

- Unobtrusive security (e.g., acoustic sensors)
- Environmental design limiting access and enhancing escape
- More teachers, guidance counselors school psychologists and smaller classes







Recommendations

- Low-key instruction or video during orientation
- Reconsider the requirements under R.I. Gen. Laws § 16-21-4
- Active shooter simulations without student involvement
- Favor unobtrusive security measures
- Prohibit campus carry
- Duly sworn campus safety officers should be armed
- Student centeredness is more than just words
- Require faculty to be trained in dealing effectively with difficult situations and difficult students and colleagues.

Unpacking School Shooting Data

From 2012/13 through 2021/22, there were more than nearly 800 K-12 school-related shootings involving **1,285 victims** (1,039 of whom were injured in any way), according to a database from the Center for Homeland Defense and Security.



Active shooter events 2020-22 in K-12 schools




- In total, 132 killed and 198 wounded in the 48 incidents.
- More than half of the fatalities (74) we linked to four incidents: Sandy Hook (26); Parkland (17); Santa Fe (10); and Uvalde (21).
- One-third of ASE had no fatalities and some had no casualties

Active Shooter Drills

- ECSU's blunder in its "active shooter" exercise
- Training is fine, but do not involve the students







"That was really scary actually," said Karina Muro a student at Cal State Univ-Sonoma "When they came in, I thought they had real guns."
