

Landlord Tenant Handbook 2024 Update

Special Legislative Commission to Study & Provide Recommendations to Update and Clarify the "Residential Landlord and Tenant Act," October 2, , 2024



What is the Landlord Tenant Handbook?

A written guide for consumers relating to the rights and duties of landlords and tenants maintained by the new Department of Housing.

- The Landlord Tenant Handbook is a consumer guide of what the law is currently in a format that can be used and understood by both landlords and tenants.
- Outlines the rights and responsibilities of landlords and tenants as enumerated in the Rhode Island General Laws.
- Benefits both renters and landlords by providing one centralized location for information on the many different and complex statutes related to housing.
- RI has had a Landlord Tenant Handbook in the past, but the Department of Housing is now actively updating it on biannual basis.



Recent Legislation and the Handbook

- In recent years, there have been many changes to Rhode Island's laws on housing, land-use, and other areas affecting landlords and tenants. For example:
 - Prohibition on source of income discrimination.
 - Lead hazard mitigation changes.
 - Creation of Department of Housing.
- Primary sources of law:
 - The Residential Landlord and Tenant Act (RIGL 34-18).
 - The Fair Housing Practices Act, (RIGL 34-37).
 - Lead Hazard Mitigation Act (RIGL 42-128.1).
 - Housing Maintenance and Occupancy Code (RIGL 45-24.3).
- Under law passed in 2023, the Handbook is to be updated at least every two years and must be available in English and Spanish.



Drafting the New Handbook

The Department of Housing worked with community organizations, attorneys, subject matter experts, and stakeholders to develop a new draft handbook.

- The preliminary draft document was developed by the Rhode Island Center for Justice in collaboration with Rhode Island Legal Services (RILS), Housing Works RI, and other partners.
- First update to the Landlord Tenant Handbook since 2007.
- Goal was to provide a factual presentation of the law without editorialization that is easily accessed and understood by the public.
- New draft Handbook was posted online in December 2023.







Public Comment

Department posted draft handbook in December, accepted written comments by email, and held an in-person comment session

- Comments from the public were accepted by email from January 1st to March 7th.
- An in-person public comment session was held at DOA on February 29th.
- Received feedback from:
 - RI HUD Field Office staff
 - Health Equity Zones
 - Realtors Association
 - Landlord and tenant groups
 - Members of the public



Comment Review and Legislative Updates

- Department catalogued all the comments received via both email and in-person, then conducted an internal review.
- Legal Review
- Updates following General Assembly session
 - After the General Assembly session, staff went through the draft handbook and updated sections to reflect recently passed legislation.
 - (ex) The rental increase notice period was increased with the passage of S 2189 so that section of the handbook was updated to incorporate the new requirements.
- Following public comment and legislative updates, we went back to Center for Justice and RILS for another review.
- Then one more internal review for clarity and consistency.



Translation

- One of the most frequent comments we received was to make the Handbook available in more languages than just English and Spanish.
- Currently working with Purchasing to translate the newly updated Handbook into the following languages:
 - Spanish

- Haitian
- Portuguese
- Arabic

- Mandarin
- French
- Cantonese
- After translating into these languages, the Handbook will be accessible to at least 90% of the Low English Proficiency population of Rhode Island.



Next Steps and Future Improvements

Website:

- The new Landlord Tenant Handbook is available in English on the Department of Housing website.
- Editions in other languages will be posted as they are completed.
- Printed copies:
 - While there is no requirement that hardcopies by printed, doing so has been recommended by the Center for Justice and others, and we would like to provide this resource.
- Infographics/Explainers
 - Between now and the next update, we want to work on adding simplified resources on common topics and frequently asked questions.
