**Subject:** Amendments to FY 2022 Appropriations Act (21-H-6122)

The Governor requests that several amendments be made to the FY 2022 Appropriations Act. The amendments include changes to the appropriation amounts in Article 1, Relating to Making Appropriations in Support of FY 2022, as well as changes to various other sections of Article 1. A description of the amendments requested is provided below.

This amendment is necessary for the State continue to respond to the evolving needs of the pandemic. Because some new federal funds were recently awarded, this amendment appropriates those which were not requested in the Governor's Recommended Budget nor in subsequent amendments.

# ARTICLE 1, RELATING TO MAKING APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2022 SECTION 1, APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2022

#### **Department of Administration**

Add line for Federal Funds in the Accounts and Control Program, Page 2 in the amount of \$1,727,823. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DOA1).

Decrease Federal Funds in the Capital Asset Management and Maintenance Program, Page 5 Line 27 by \$12,004,071 from \$14,843,184 to \$2,839,113. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DOA1).

Increase Federal Funds in the Central Management Program, Page 2 Line 14 by \$2,913,072 from \$126,594,669 to \$129,507,741. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DOA1).

Decrease Federal Funds in the Information Technology Program, Page 3 Line 6 by \$327,707 from \$327,707 to \$0. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DOA1).

Increase Restricted Receipts for Grants Management System Administration in the Accounts and Control Program, Page 2 Line 23 by \$751,613 from \$330,912 to \$1,082,525. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DOA1).

Add line for Federal Funds in the Legal Services Program, Page 2 in the amount of \$300,000. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DOA1).

#### **Department of Business Regulation**

<u>Decrease Federal Funds in the Central Management Program, Page 6 Line 5 by \$1,646,467 from \$1,646,467 to \$0</u>. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DBR1).

#### **Executive Office of Commerce**

Increase Federal Funds in the Central Management Program, Page 7 Line 11 by \$313,975 from \$161,250 to \$475.225. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-EOC1).

Increase Federal Funds in the Housing and Community Development Program, Page 7 Line 151 by \$4,142,550 from \$11,924,436 to \$16,066,986. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-EOC1).

#### **Executive Office of Health and Human Services**

Decrease Federal Funds in the Central Management Program, Page 12 Line 21 by \$2,790,130 from \$124,063,358 to \$121,273,228. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the

COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-EOHHS1).

#### Department of Children, Youth, and Families

<u>Decrease Federal Funds in the Child Welfare Program, Page 13 Line 29 by \$1,375,593 from \$68,770,417 to \$67,394,825</u>. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DCYF1).

#### **Department of Health**

Increase Restricted Receipts in the Central Management Program, Page 14 Line 5 by \$17,203,664 from \$10,667,820 to \$27,871,484. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures projected costs for the full fiscal year across ten areas including vaccine, testing, epidemiological operations, surge, quarantine and isolation, high density communities, technology enablement, quantitative analysis, community mitigation, communications, and administrative assistance (22-RIDOH1).

Increase Federal Funds in the COVID-19 Program, Page 15 Line 15 by \$58,040,311 from \$161,721,718 to \$220,242,050. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures projected costs for the full fiscal year across ten areas including vaccine, testing, epidemiological operations, surge, quarantine and isolation, high density communities, technology enablement, quantitative analysis, community mitigation, communications, and administrative assistance (22-RIDOH1).

Decrease Federal Funds in the Health Laboratories and Medical Examiner Program, Page 14 Line 27 by \$480,020 from \$2,878,489 to \$2,398,469. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures projected costs for the full fiscal year across ten areas including vaccine, testing, epidemiological operations, surge, quarantine and isolation, high density communities, technology enablement, quantitative analysis, community mitigation, communications, and administrative assistance (22-RIDOH1).

#### **Department of Human Services**

<u>Decrease Federal Funds in the Office of Veterans Services Program, Page 16 Line 12 by \$1,754,484 from \$11,625,281 to \$9,870,797</u>. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DHS1).

#### **Department of Corrections**

Decrease Federal Funds in the Healthcare Services Program, Page 27 Line 3 by \$139,103 from \$193,103 to \$54,000. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DOC1).

#### **Emergency Management Agency**

Decrease Federal Funds, Page 29 Line 34 by \$649,871 from \$16,472,597 to \$15,822,726. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-EMA1).

#### **Department of Environmental Management**

<u>Decrease Federal Funds in the Bureau of Natural Resources Program, Page 30 Line 15 by \$335,000 from \$21,970,240 to \$21,635,240</u>. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the

COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DEM1).

#### **Department of Transportation**

<u>Decrease Federal Funds in the Infrastructure Maintenance Program, Page 32 Line 3 by \$38,585 from \$18,077,170 to \$18,038,585</u>. The Governor's recommendation assumed a six-month budget for the COVID-19 response in FY 2022. To account for the comprehensive response effort, this amendment captures adjustments in projected costs for the full fiscal year (22-DOT1).

#### SECTION 11, FY 2022 FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT (FTE) POSITION AUTHORIZATION

#### **Department of Health**

Increase Full-Time Equivalent Positions for the Department of Health, Page 35 Line 26 by 15.0 FTE, from 517.6 FTE positions to 532.6 FTE positions. This increase in FTE authorization is requested to enable the Department of Health to fill fifteen (15.0) positions on existing or newly awarded federal grants and associated restricted receipt funding. These positions are all in various stages of the recruitment process but have remained unfilled because of the enacted FTE cap. These positions are necessary to fulfill immediate and critical operational needs related to pandemic response. As of May 22, 2021, the Department of Health had exceeded its FY 2021 Enacted FTE cap of 513.6, with 515.4 FTE filled. The fifteen (15.0) new positions span four critical functions:

- 1. Five (5.0) FTE positions to support the increase in financial oversight and reporting for additional federal awards, including two FTE to support the procurement work associated with the pandemic response
- 2. Four (4.0) FTE positions to provide high-level, operational leadership for the new Health Disparities grant from the CDC
- 3. Three (3.0) FTE positions to support the immediate and ongoing analytic, clinical, and epidemiological work that is rapidly increasing due to the emergence of new outbreaks, novel variants, and continued monitoring of mass vaccination efforts.
- 4. Three (3.0) additional FTE positions to support mission-critical work for the Department, including a Deputy Director, one position to meet the new federal requirements for infection control, and one position to supervise efforts to ensure compliance with clean water regulations.

As an aid to this request, attached is a list of the fifteen (15.0) positions that will be filled as a result of this increase in FTE authorization.

<sup>\*</sup>The ARPA appropriated to the U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services for federal fiscal year 2021, \$49.6B across all states and eligible recipients to remain available until expended, to carry out activities to detect, diagnose, trace, and monitor SARS—CoV—2 and COVID—19 infections and related strategies to mitigate the spread of COVID—19. \$10B has been appropriated to date for K-12 testing leaving significant funding available for additional awards covering the following functions: (1) implement a national, evidence-based strategy for testing, contact tracing, surveillance, and mitigation with respect to SARS—CoV—2 and COVID—19, including through activities authorized under section 319(a) of the Public Health Service Act; (2) provide technical assistance, guidance, and support, and award grants or cooperative agreements to State, local, and territorial public health departments for activities to detect, diagnose, trace, and monitor SARS—CoV—2 and COVID—19 infections and related strategies and activities to mitigate the spread of COVID—19; (4) establish and expand Federal, State, local, and territorial testing and contact tracing capabilities, including— (A) through investments in laboratory capacity, such as—(i) academic and research laboratories, or other laboratories that could be used for processing of COVID—19 testing; (ii) community-based testing sites and community-based organizations; or (iii) mobile health units, particularly in medically underserved areas; and (B) with respect to quarantine and isolation of contacts.
