Explanation by State Budget Office:

This bill would amend Rhode Island General Laws Chapter 44-18 entitled "Sales and Use Taxes – Liability and Computation" by adding to Rhode Island General Laws Section 44-18-30 titled "Gross receipts exempt from sales and use taxes" subsection (67), a provision that would exempt from sales and use tax scalp hair prosthesis that are prescribed by a physician and worn for hair loss suffered as a result of the treatment of any form of cancer or leukemia and for hair loss suffered as a result of alopecia areata.

Under Rhode Island General Laws Section 44-18-30(11) titled "Gross receipts exempt from sales and use taxes – Prosthetic devices and mobility enhancing equipment", a prosthetic device as defined in § 44-18-7.1(t), sold on prescription, including, but not limited to: artificial limbs, dentures, spectacles, eyeglasses, and artificial eyes; artificial hearing devices and hearing aids, whether or not sold on prescription; and mobility enhancing equipment are exempt from sales and use taxes. Under this provision, scalp hair prosthesis (hair systems and wigs) are also exempt from sales and use taxes.

Comments on Sources of Funds:

All sales and use taxes are general revenues.

Summary of Facts and Assumptions:

Scalp hair prosthesis prescribed by a physician is exempt pursuant to R.I. Gen. Laws § 44-18-30(11) as a prosthetic device. As this is already excluded from the tax base, there would be no revenue loss.

Summary of Fiscal Impact: FY 2020: Not applicable given an assumed implementation date of July 1, 2020.
